Community Health Assessment Process

The process followed by the 2026 Huron County CHA reflected an adapted version of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's County Health Rankings and Roadmaps: Assess Needs and Resources process. This process is designed to help stakeholders "understand current community strengths, resources, needs, and gaps," so that they can better focus their efforts and collaboration.

Project Management

The Huron County Health Partners' Steering Committee contracted with Illuminology, a central Ohio based research firm, to assist with this work. Illuminology is located at 5258 Bethel Reed Park, Columbus, OH 43220. Illuminology, represented by Karen A. Hines, Ph.D., and Orië V. Kristel, Ph.D., led the process for locating health status indicator data; for designing and conducting the adult survey; and for creating the summary report. Illuminology has 27 years of experience related to research design, analysis, and reporting, and has conducted numerous community health assessments.

The Huron County Health Partners' Steering Committee approved the process to be used in this health assessment. The following phases of the health assessment process, as adapted for use in Huron County, included the following steps.

(1) Prepare to assess / generate questions. On February 11, 2026, community leaders, stakeholders, and employees from participating organizations gathered at Fisher-Titus Medical Center to discuss their perspectives on emerging health issues in Huron County. Facilitated by Illuminology, this session provided an opportunity for community members to better understand the upcoming community health assessment process and to suggest indicators for consideration. Illuminology used the information from this session to identify which indicators could be assessed via secondary sources and which indicators needed to be included as part of the primary data collection efforts. See Appendix A for more information about this session.

(2) Collect secondary data. Secondary data for this health assessment came from national sources (e.g., U.S. Department of Health and Human Services: *Healthy People 2030*; U.S. Census Bureau), state sources (e.g., Ohio Department of Health), and local sources (e.g., Fisher-Titus Medical Center; The Bellevue Hospital). Data for Huron County overall and Ohio were collected when available. Rates and/or percentages were calculated when necessary. Illuminology located and recorded this information into a secondary data repository. All data sources are identified in table captions or footnotes. To ensure community stakeholders are able to use this report to make well-informed decisions, only the most recent data available at the time of report preparation are presented. To be considered for inclusion in the 2026 Huron County CHA, secondary data must have been collected or published in 2022 or later.

(3) Collect and analyze primary data from adult residents. A representative survey of Huron County adult residents was conducted (i.e., Huron County Health Survey). Fielded in multiple waves from April 16th, 2026 through June 5th, 2026, respondents completed a self-administered questionnaire, either on paper or online (see Appendix B).

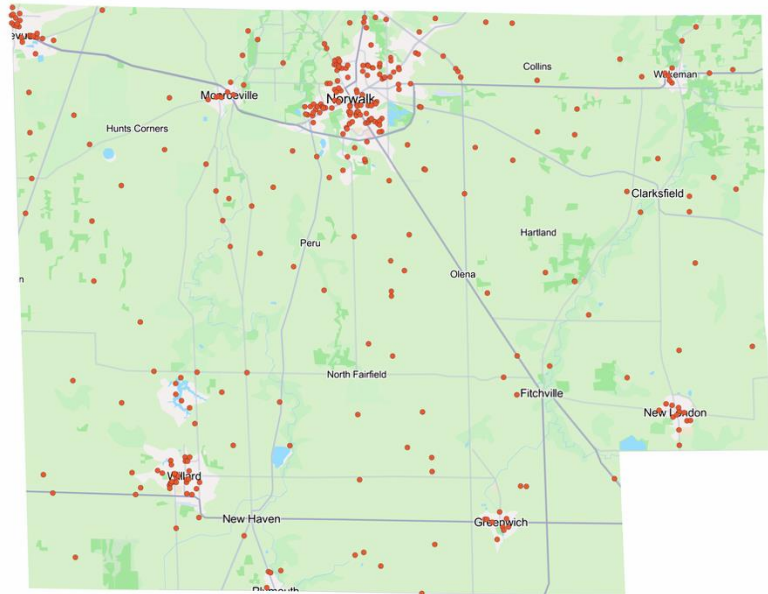
For the survey mailing, a total of 2,200 addresses were randomly selected from the universe of residential addresses in Huron County and 1,200 addresses were randomly selected from the universe of residential addresses in which the sample data indicated there was likely a young adult in the household. In mid-April, 2026, a notification letter was sent to each household, asking the adult in the household who most recently had a birthday to complete the survey online.

For 500 randomly selected participants, their mailing included a \$1 bill to encourage the household's participation. About four weeks after the initial mailing, a hard copy of the survey was sent to households that had not yet completed the survey online. This mailing also included a cover letter and a Business Reply Mail envelope so respondents could complete the survey and mail it back at no cost to them.

In total, 353 Huron County adult residents completed the survey, or 10.4% of households. With a random sample of this size, the margin of error is $\pm 5.2\%$ at the 95% confidence level.

Before analyzing responses to the survey, survey weights were computed; this step allows researchers to produce more accurate statistical estimates at the overall county level. First, a base weight was created that adjusted for unequal probabilities of selection into the survey (i.e., compensating for the number of adults in the household and whether the household had an indicator that there was likely a young adult present in the home). Then, this base weight was adjusted so that respondents' demographic characteristics (i.e., age, gender, income, educational attainment, race, and presence of children in the household) aligned with population benchmarks for Huron County. These population benchmarks were obtained from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey. This adjusted base weight was calculated via an iterative proportional fitting procedure within the STATA v17 software package; analyses of weighted data were conducted using complex survey [svy] commands within STATA v17.

(4) Identify Priority Health Needs. On June 24th, 2026, community leaders and stakeholders met in person to review the 2026 Huron County CHA and to identify priority health issues. The meeting participants were divided into small groups, with each group asked to review a specific section of the 2026 Huron County CHA, and, within that section, to identify potential priority health issues for consideration by the larger group. In addition to sharing their personal experience and history during these small-group conversations, meeting participants were asked to consider the following criteria when identifying potential priority health issues:

Equity: Degree to which specific groups are disproportionately affected by an issue.

Size: Number of persons affected, taking into account variance from benchmark data and targets.

Seriousness: Degree to which the health issue leads to death or disability, and impairs one's quality of life.

Feasibility: Ability of organization or individuals to reasonably combat the health issue given available resources. Related to the amount of control and knowledge (influence) organization(s) have on the issue.

Severity of the Consequences of Inaction: Risks associated with exacerbation of the health issue if not addressed at the earliest opportunity.

Trends: Whether or not the health issue is getting better or worse in the community over time.

Intervention: Any existing multi-level public health strategies proven to be effective in addressing the health issue.

Value: The importance of the health issue to the community.

Social Determinant / Root Cause: Whether or not the health issue is a root cause or social determinant of health that impacts one or more health issues.

Overall, a total of 15 potential priority health issues were identified. One round of voting followed by a discussion resulted in **three broad priority health issues** with specific focus areas that affect Huron County residents.

These priority health needs are reviewed in the next section of this report.

Priority #1: Mental Health

Huron County community stakeholders identified mental health as a top priority, with particular concern around suicide prevention and anxiety and depression affecting residents of all ages. Anxiety rates increased from 19% in 2023 to 22% in 2026. Similarly, depression rates also increased from 17% in 2023 to 22% in 2026. The group noted that anxiety and depression manifest differently across age groups – for youth, key drivers include truancy, bullying, and social media exposure, while economic stress was cited as the primary contributor among adults. This is supported by statistics showing 33% of respondents indicated a negative impact on their level of anxiety or depression due to changes in the economy. Suicide prevention received the highest number of votes during the prioritization exercise. Survey data show there were 4% of residents that seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year, with no change from 2023.

A recurring theme was that the community perceives a shortage of mental health and addiction resources in Huron County; however, stakeholders clarified that the more pressing issue is a lack of awareness of existing services combined with affordability barriers, rather than a true gap in resource availability.

Priority #2: Population Health

The group prioritized several chronic disease concerns under the population health umbrella, with older adult fall prevention, vaccination awareness, cancer prevention, and chronic diseases (particularly obesity) rising to the top. Falls among older adults were flagged as a significant and growing threat given Huron County's aging population. Vaccination awareness – specifically flu shots – emerged as another health need. The group suggested that media distrust has contributed to declining vaccination rates and that targeted messaging should distinguish flu vaccination from other vaccines to reduce hesitancy. Given the Healthy People 2030 objectives were not met for colorectal or lung cancer, the group also placed an emphasis on cancer prevention. They discussed rising incidence rates – particularly among younger populations – and barriers such as screening stigma and cost. Vaping was highlighted as a major risk factor for lung cancer that requires targeted education, as youth often perceive it as safer than smoking. Obesity and healthy eating were also a concern as the group called for increasing the accessibility of healthy food through community gardens, seasonal cooking classes, and mini-grant opportunities as practical strategies.

Transportation, affordable housing, and walking paths and bike trails were identified as the core social determinants shaping health outcomes in Huron County. On housing, stakeholders emphasized the need for quality, modest, and integrated housing for seniors and low-income residents, with integration into the broader community seen as key to breaking cycles of poverty and isolation. Walking and biking infrastructure emerged as a cross-cutting priority: lower-income community members have specifically requested these amenities, and the group recognized that such paths connect physical activity and transportation and impact chronic disease prevention. Underlying all three areas was a recognized need for better resource navigation – many residents are unaware of or unable to afford available services and improving visibility and coordinated referrals through primary care was seen as essential to closing that gap.

For context, Ohio's 2020-2022 State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP) identified three cross-cutting factors (i.e., social determinants of health that include community conditions, health behaviors, and access to care) as well as three health outcome categories (i.e., mental health and addiction, chronic disease, and maternal and infant health) that should be considered when planning to improve the community's health. Overall, there is very strong alignment between the Huron County 2026 CHA's prioritized health needs and Ohio's 2020-2022 SHIP.

How to Read This Report

Key findings. As shown on page 2, the 2026 Huron County CHA is organized into multiple, distinct sections. Each section begins with story boxes that highlight and summarize the key research findings from the researchers' perspectives.

Healthy People 2030. For some indicators, Huron County is compared to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services *Healthy People 2030* goal, indicated with text next to the *Healthy People 2030* logo (<https://odphp.health.gov/healthypeople>). In addition, a table comparing Huron County to the *Healthy People 2030* goals can be found on page 67.

Comparison to the Huron County 2023 Community Health Assessment. Where possible, results were compared to data from the Huron County 2023 Community Health Assessment and denoted by a light blue clock symbol. In addition, a table comparing 2023 data to 2026 data can be found on page 65.

Health disparities between populations or areas in the community. Analyses explored statistically significant differences in results based on demographic factors such as age, gender, income, education, geographic region, and presence of children in the household. When these analyses suggested the presence of significant differences among specific populations, the report tables display a magnifying glass symbol. These disparities are also outlined in Appendix E.

Qualitative findings from the adult survey. The adult survey included an open-ended question: "In your opinion, what is the most important issue affecting the people who live in Huron County?" The responses to that question were coded into categories and a summary of those categories is displayed on page 16. In addition, light blue boxes throughout the report display responses to this question where relevant.

Sources for all secondary data are identified in table captions or footnotes. Caution should be used in drawing conclusions in cases where data are sparse (e.g., counts less than ten).

Adult primary data (i.e., from the representative survey of adults) are displayed in graphs throughout the report. In some cases, the percentages may not sum to 100% due to rounding and/or because multiple responses were accepted.

Appendix C displays demographic and economic overviews of various cities, townships, and other communities within Huron County.

Appendix E of this report includes a list of community assets and resources that could possibly be mobilized and leveraged to address the priority health issues identified by this process.

Appendix F presents the results of the OHYES! survey of middle and high school student experiences.

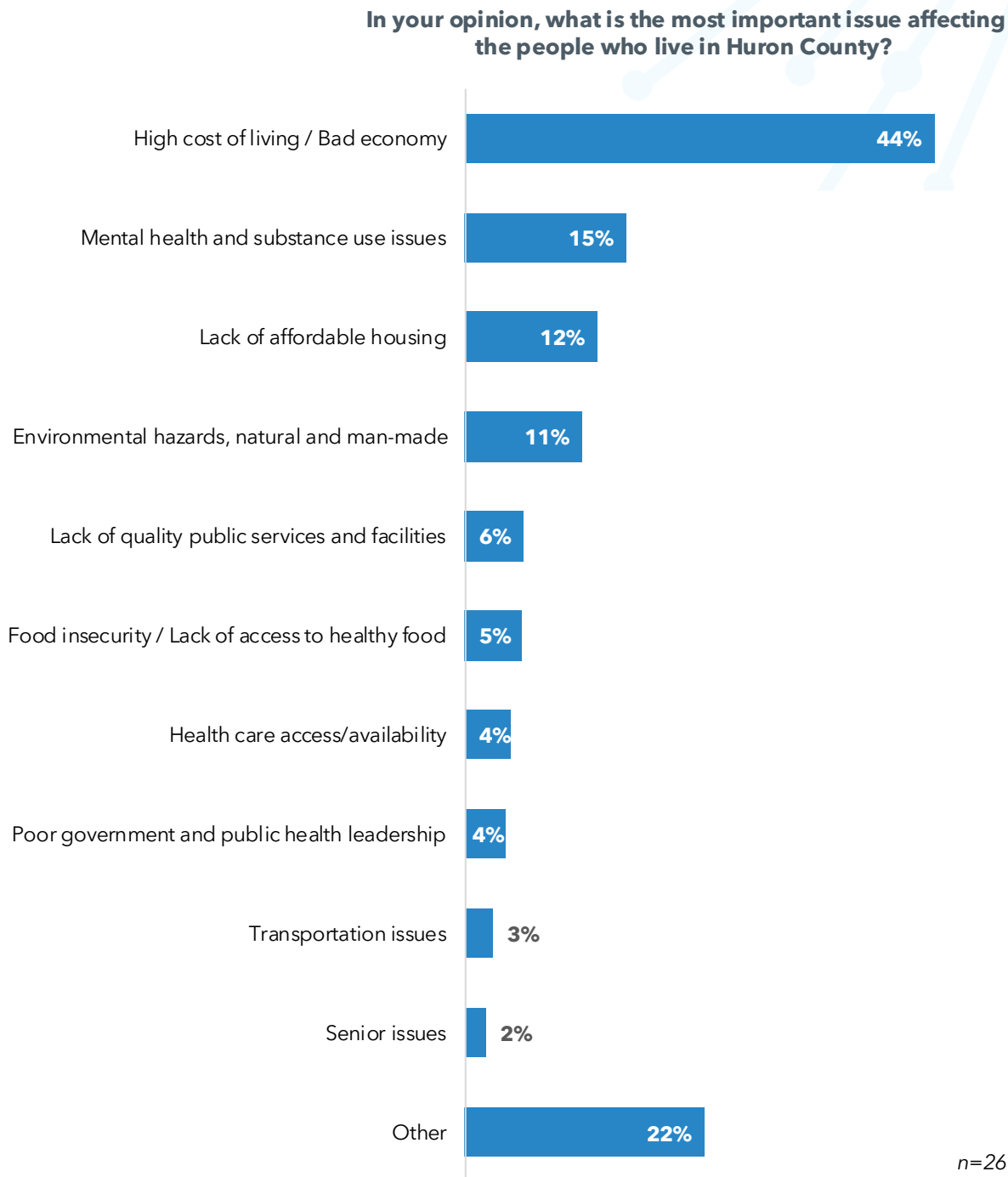

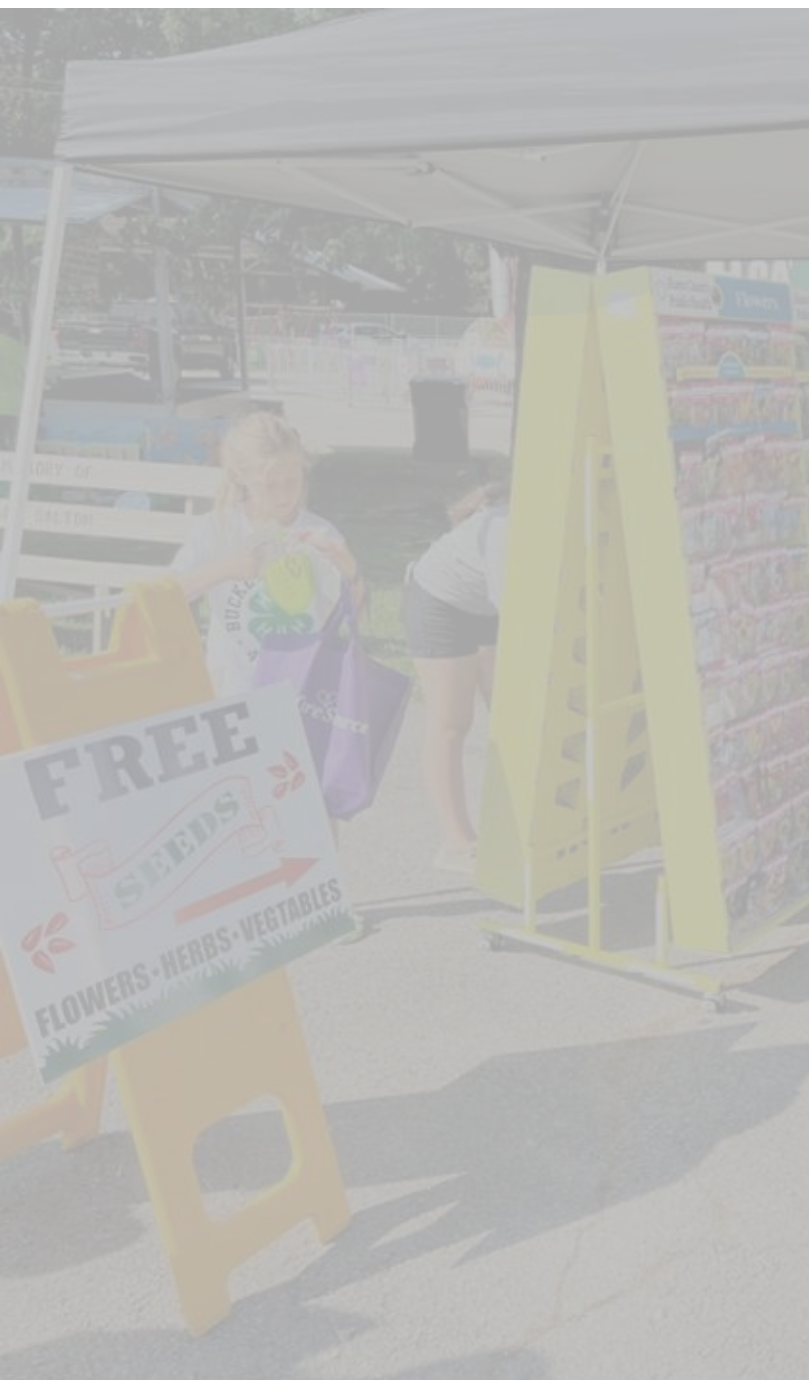
RESIDENTS' PRIORITIES

According to the representative survey, residents perceive high costs of living / bad economy, mental health and substance use, lack of affordable housing, and environmental hazards as the most important issues affecting Huron County. "Other" responses included poor physical health, a challenging job market, and poverty.



SOCIAL DETERMINANTS OF HEALTH

This section provides insight into how Huron County residents fare when it comes to many social determinants of health, including levels of poverty, access to health care, and education outcomes. Social and structural determinants of health provide insight into what causes higher health risks or poorer health outcomes among specific populations, including community and other factors which contribute to health inequities or disparities.



KEY FINDINGS

Health Care Access

- ▶ About 76% of adult residents have been to the doctor for a routine checkup in the past year and about 64% of adult residents have been to a dental clinic in the past year
- ▶ About 50% of residents traveled outside of Huron County for health care; this percentage is significantly higher than in 2023 (42%). Residents most commonly traveled outside the county for specialty care.

Financial Hardship

- ▶ 19% of children and 9% of seniors in Huron County are living in poverty

Economic Stability

Economic stability plays an important role in health, with at least one study on this topic showing that those with greater income had greater life expectancy (Chetty et al., 2016).¹ In Huron, the unemployment rate (4.0%) is slightly lower than the unemployment rate in Ohio (4.8%).

One way housing affordability is measured by the U.S. Census Bureau is through selected monthly ownership costs as a percent of household income (SMOCAPI). Included in monthly ownership costs are payments involved in purchasing a home as well as expenditures for insurance, real estate taxes, utilities, and fuel. Condominium fees and mobile home costs are also included when applicable. A similar measure for renters exists as gross rent as a percentage of household income (GRAPI). The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has historically considered families whose housing costs exceed 30% of their income to be cost-burdened.

According to the representative survey, it is estimated that among Huron County homeowners and renters **16% are spending 30% or more of their household income on housing** payments and **7% are spending 50% or more of their household income on housing** payments.

Resident Priority: Lack of Affordable Housing

"Property taxes are too high, thus causing rentals to be unreachable."

"Finding adequate and affordable housing for families."

"Affordable housing and finding a good paying job."

"High real estate prices."

Economic instability is linked to food insecurity. People who are food insecure do not get adequate food or have disrupted eating patterns due to lack of money and other resources. The percentage of the population who lack adequate access to food is similar in Huron County (15.9%) and Ohio (15.3%). Additionally, some researchers use the food environment index when assessing access to nutritious foods. This index of factors that contribute to a healthy food environment ranges from 0 (worst) to 10 (best). Huron County's food environment index score between 2019-2023 (7.8) was higher than Ohio's score (7.0).

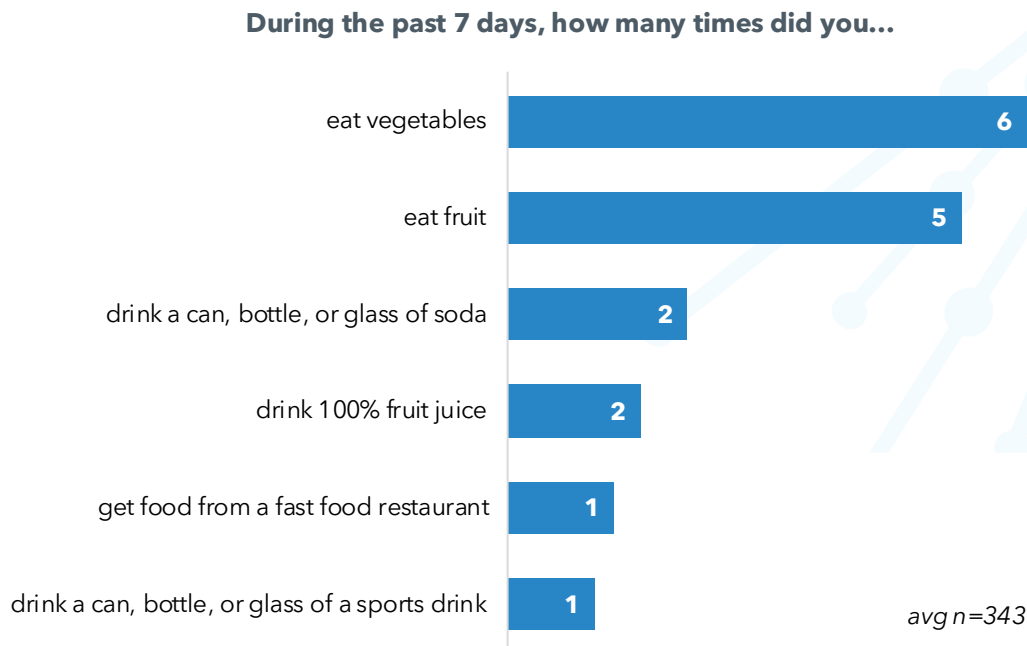

Among respondents who reported eating fruit in the past 7 days, those with a graduate or professional degree ate fruit the most, on average, (9.6 times) and those with an associate degree ate fruit the least (4.8 times).

Those with household incomes of \$50,000 or higher ate vegetables more times in the past 7 days, on average, (6.6) than those with household incomes below \$50,000 (4.7).

Respondents with less than a bachelor's degree were more likely to report drinking regular soda or pop in the past 7 days (55.3%) than those with a bachelor's degree or higher (27.7%).

Respondents with household incomes of \$25,000-\$49,999 drank regular soda the most in the past 7 days, on average, (3.4 times) and those with household incomes of \$50,000-\$74,999 drank regular soda the least (1.1 times).

Respondents aged 18-39 were more likely to report getting fast food in the past 7 days (79.1%) than those aged 40 or over (58.0%).

Among respondents who reported drinking 100% fruit juice in the past 7 days, female respondents drank juice more times, on average, (3.4) than non-female respondents (2.5).

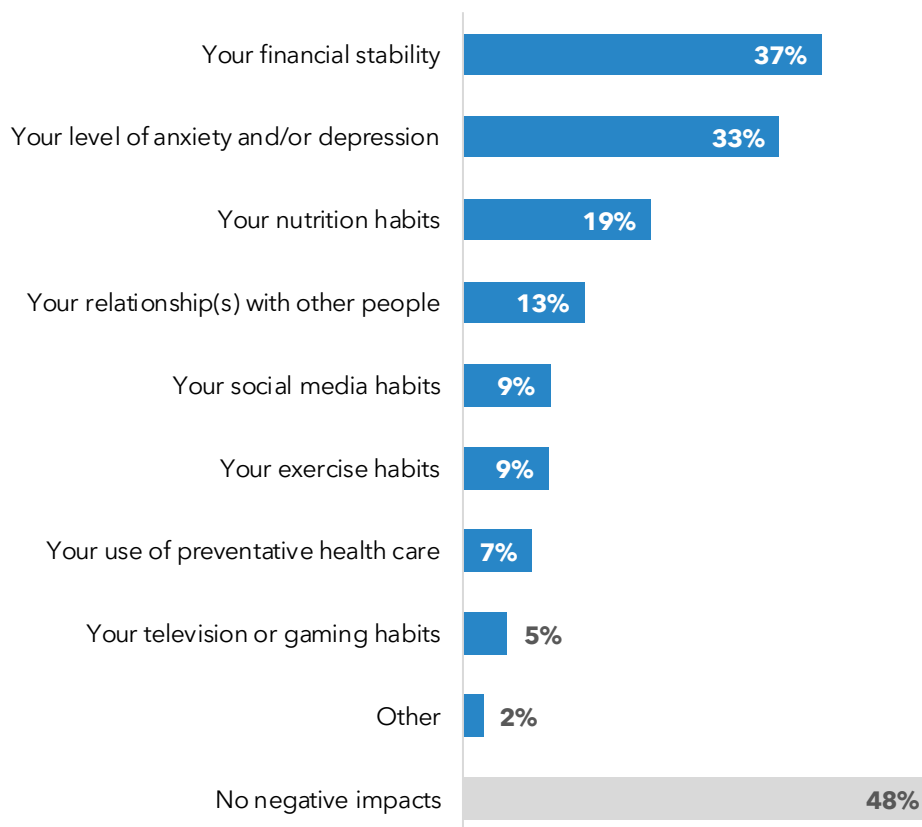

Respondents with at least one child in the household were more likely to report that cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted their exercise habits (18.7%) than respondents without children in the household (5.6%).

Respondents with more than a high school degree/GED were more likely to report that cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted their exercise habits (17.3%) than those with a high school degree/GED or less (2.7%).

Female respondents were more likely to report cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted their relationships with other people (20.1%) than non-female respondents (7.4%).

Reporting that cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted relationships with other people was highest among respondents with a bachelor's degree (23.0%) and lowest among respondents with less than a 12th grade education (2.6%).

Respondents aged 18-59 were more likely to report cost of living / economy changes negatively affected financial stability (46.6%) than those aged 60 and over (22.1%).

Reporting that cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted financial stability was highest among respondents with a bachelor's degree (48.5%) and lowest among respondents with less than a 12th grade education (2.6%).

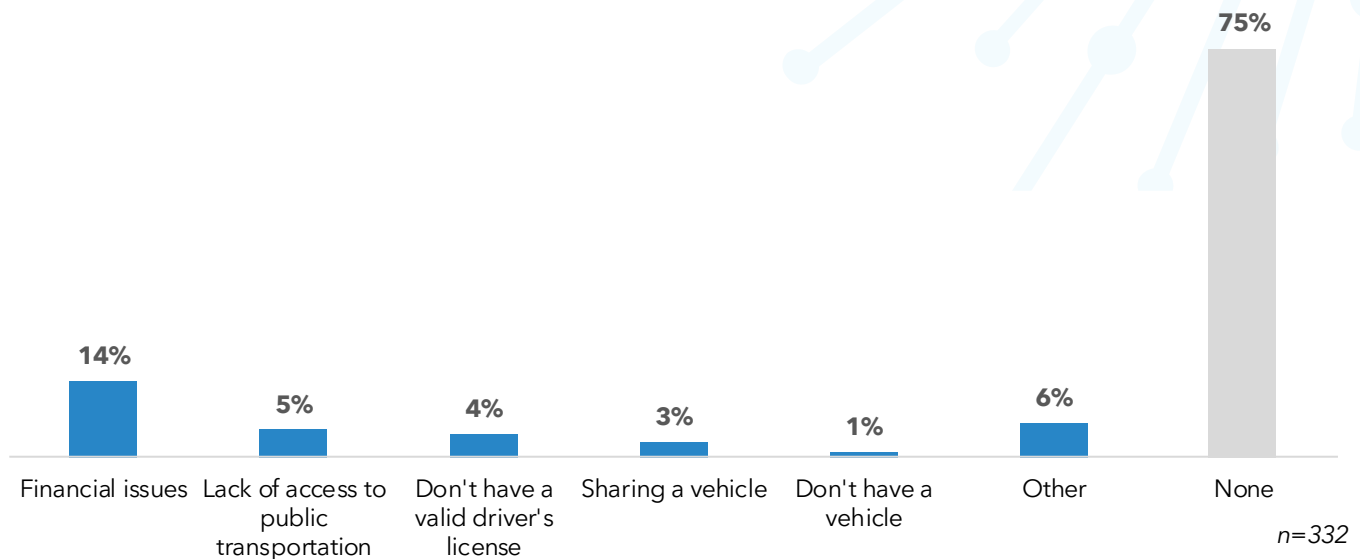

Respondents with a bachelor's degree or higher were more likely to report no transportation issues (94.1%) than those with less than a bachelor's degree (71.7%).

Education

Educational attainment can affect employment opportunities and economic stability, which in turn impacts many health outcomes.

Regarding young children in Huron County, 32% are considered to have demonstrated readiness to begin kindergarten, meaning they entered with “sufficient skills, knowledge and abilities to engage with kindergarten-level instruction.” Additionally, 69% of third graders are considered at least proficient in English Language Arts.

Health Care Access

Healthcare access is the ability of individuals to obtain necessary and appropriate health services in a timely manner, encompassing availability, accessibility, affordability, acceptability, and quality of care. It is critically important because it leads to improved health outcomes, prevents disease, reduces health disparities, and enhances overall quality of life for individuals and communities. Ultimately, equitable healthcare access forms a cornerstone of a thriving society by ensuring its members can lead healthy, productive lives.

One factor of this affordability is the ability to utilize health insurance. Most Huron County residents have health insurance, though around 7% of children do not, higher than the percentage of children in Ohio overall (5%).

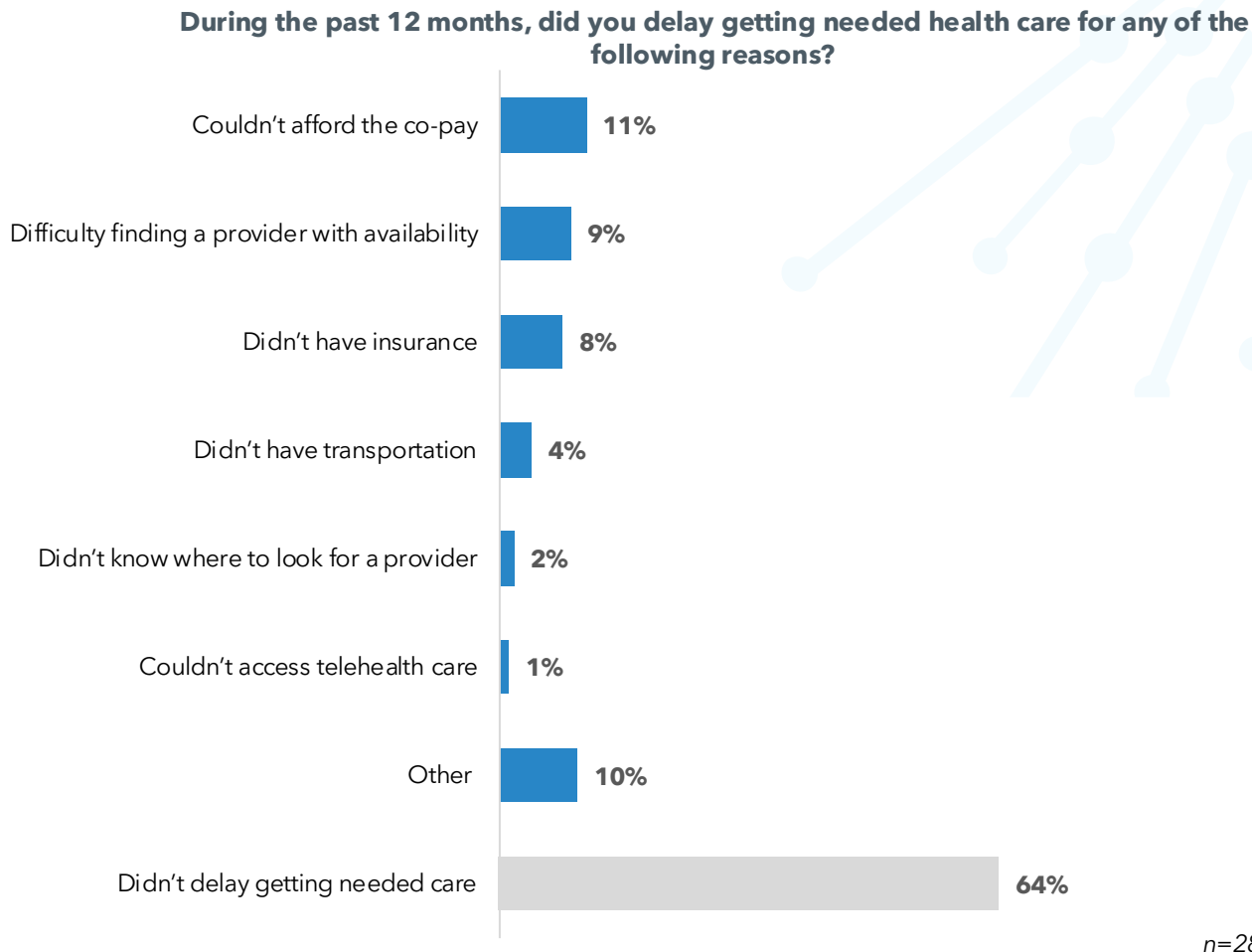

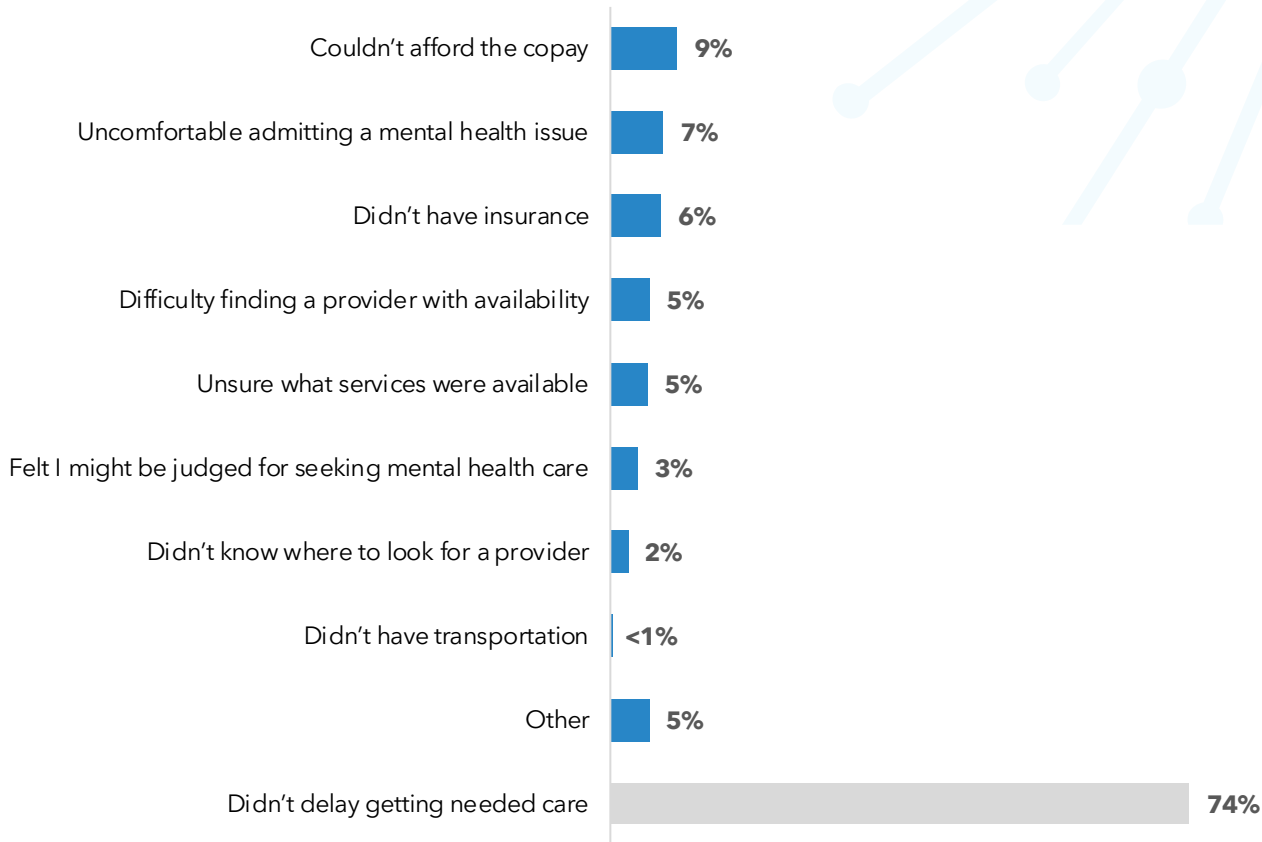

During the past 12 months, have you delayed getting needed mental health care or services for any of the following reasons?



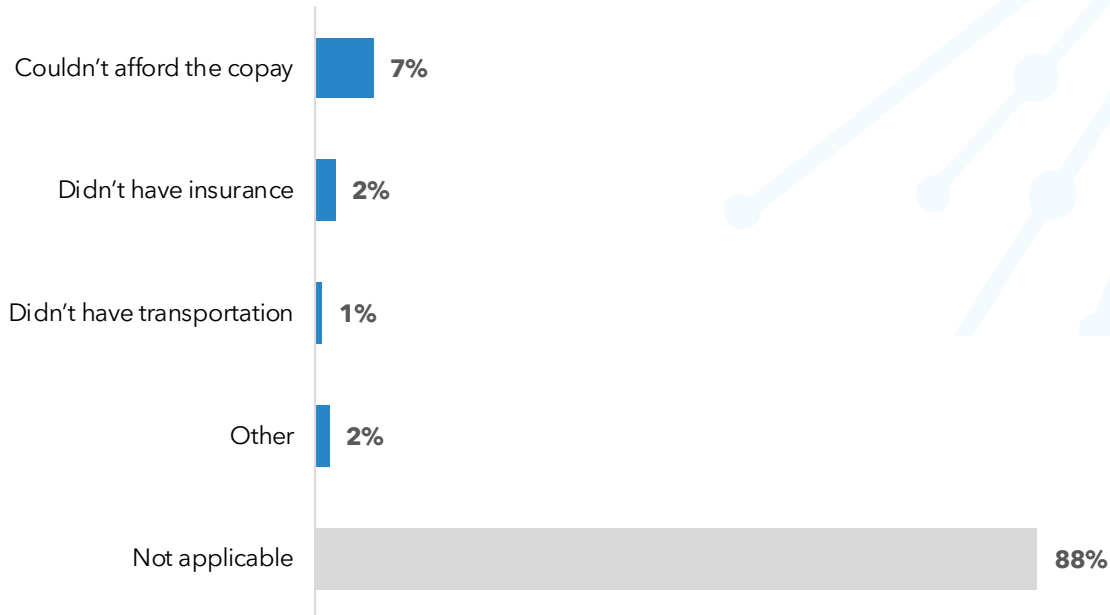

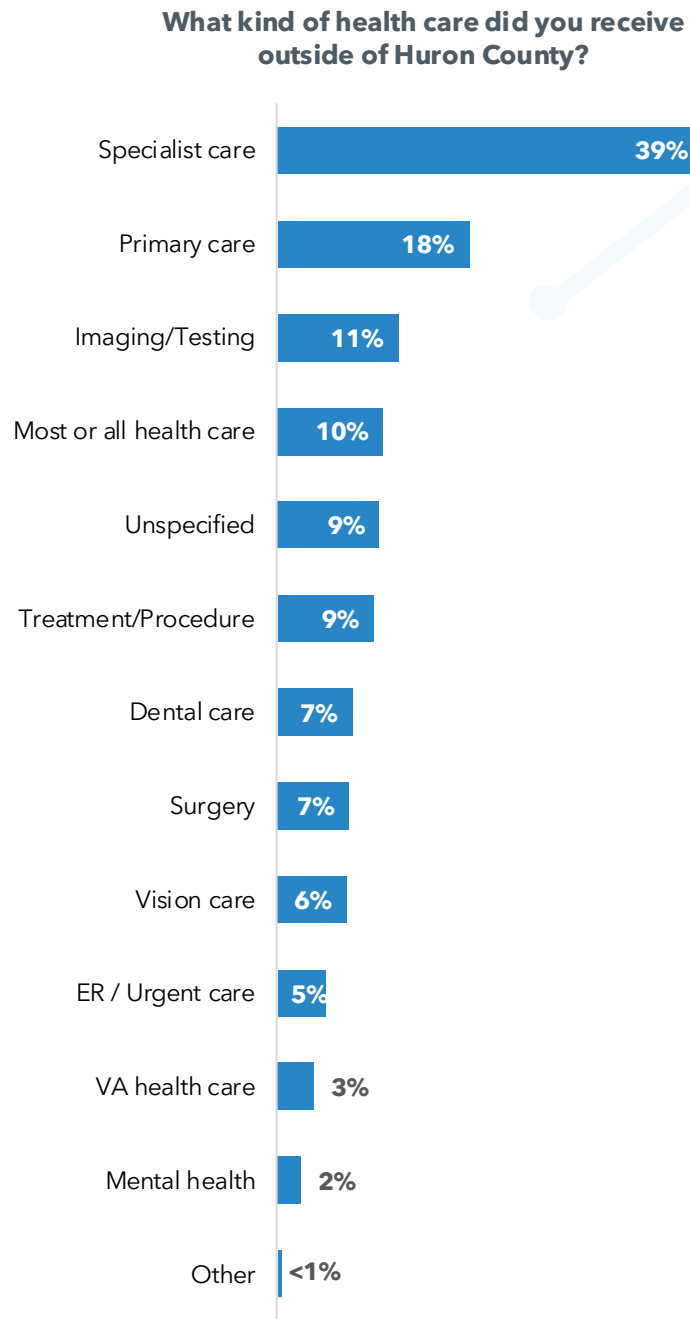

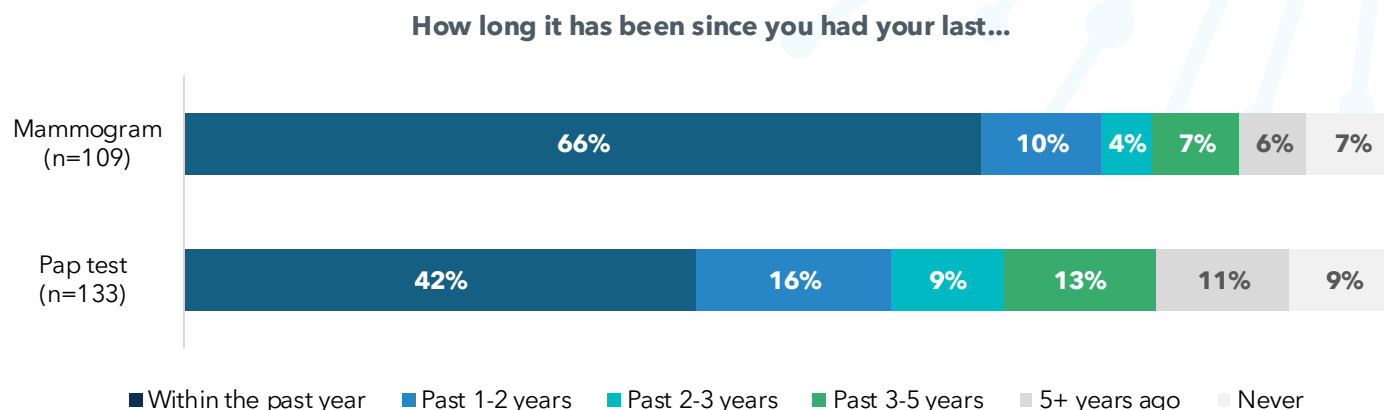

A mammogram is an x-ray of each breast to look for breast cancer, and The American Cancer Society recommends that women should start having annual mammograms at age 45 and may opt to have mammograms every other year starting at age 55. According to the representative survey, 66% of women 45 or older have had a mammogram within the past year; 10% have had one in the past 1-2 years.

A Pap test is a test for cancer of the cervix. According to the Mayo Clinic, doctors normally recommend Pap tests every three years for women age 21 to 65. According to the representative survey, about 68% of women aged 21 to 65 have had a Pap test within the past 3 years.

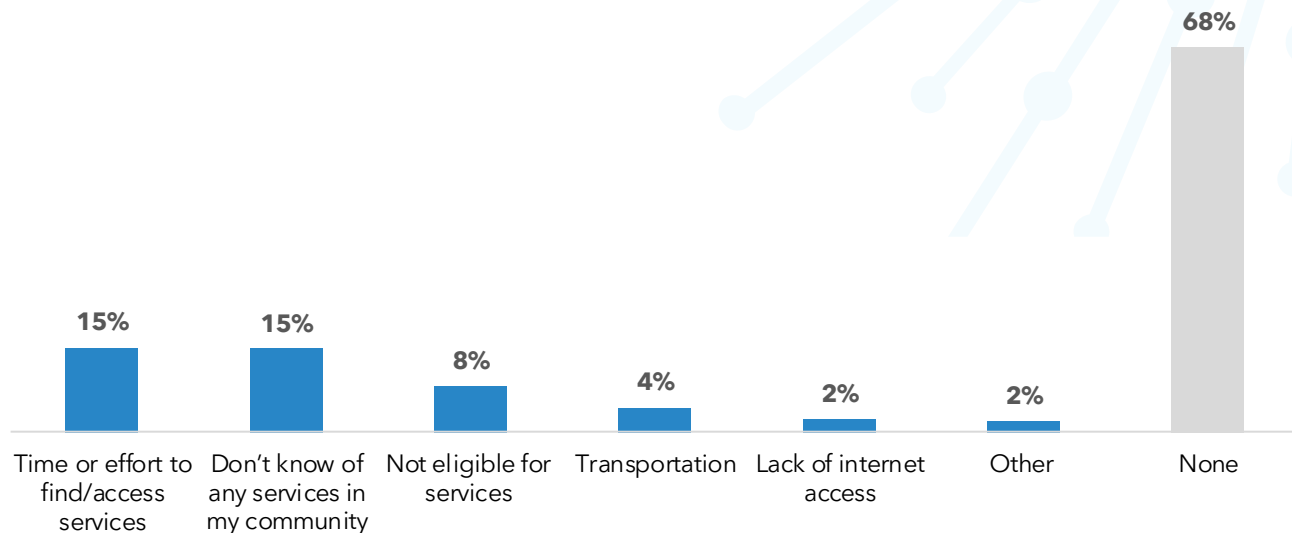

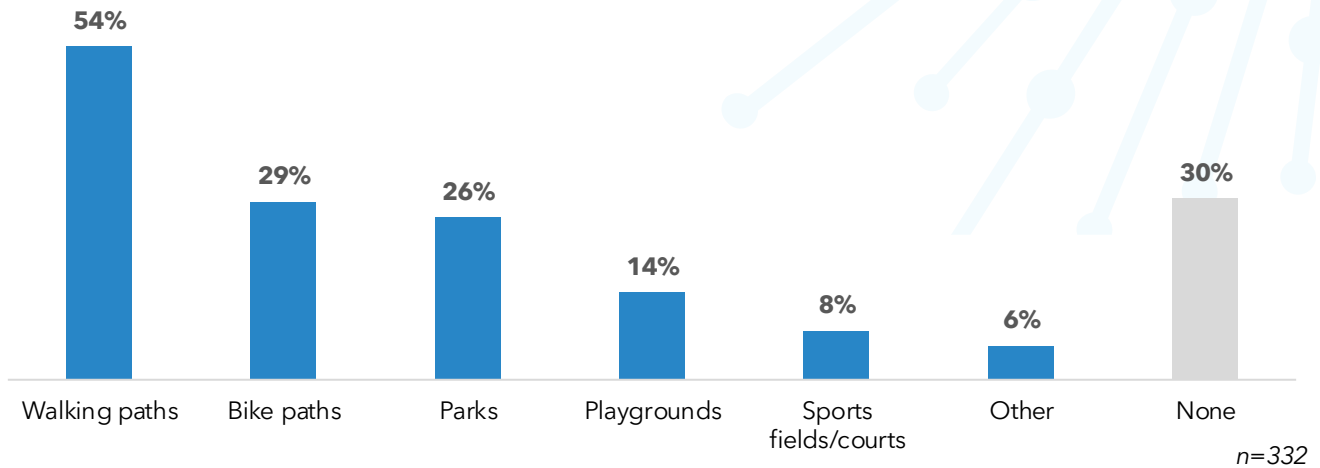

Reporting wanting more walking paths for physical activity or leisure was highest among respondents with household incomes below \$25,000 (79.9%) and lowest among respondents with household incomes of \$75,000-\$99,999 (40.5%).

Respondents without children in the household were more likely to report wanting more walking paths for physical activity or leisure (63.4%) than those with at least one child in the household (39.0%).

Respondents with more than a high school degree/GED were more likely to report wanting more walking paths for physical activity or leisure (64.5%) than those with a high school degree/GED or less (47.4%).

Respondents with more than a high school degree/GED were more likely to report wanting more bike paths for physical activity or leisure (41.2%) than those with a high school degree/GED or less (21.3%).

Reporting wanting more parks for physical activity or leisure was highest among respondents with a bachelor's degree (44.2%) and lowest among those with less than a 12th grade education (4.2%).

Norwalk respondents were more likely to report wanting more playgrounds for physical activity or leisure (25.3%) than those outside Norwalk (9.8%).

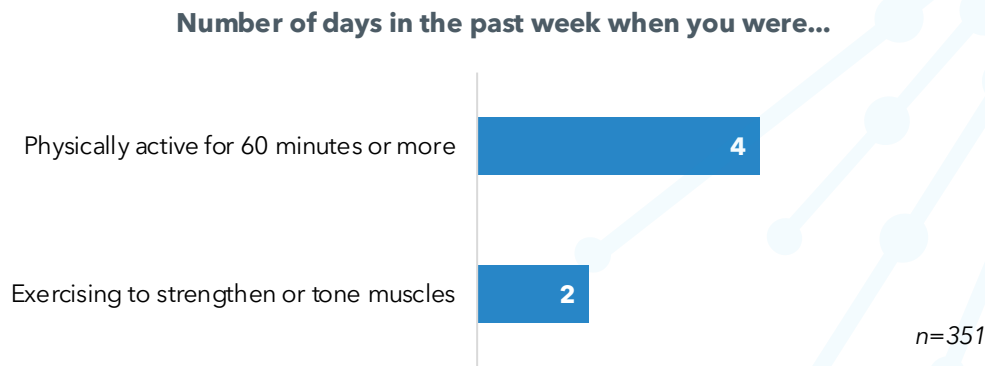

Respondents with at least one child in the household were more likely to report strengthening or toning exercises on at least one day during the past 7 days (51.6%) than those without children in the household (31.7%).

Respondents with a bachelor's degree or higher were more likely to report strengthening or toning exercises on at least one day during the past 7 days (56.5%) than those with less than a bachelor's degree (34.4%).

Non-female respondents did strengthening or toning exercises on more days, on average, (2.0) than female respondents (1.1).

According to the representative survey, 43% of Huron County residents are obese and 36% are overweight.

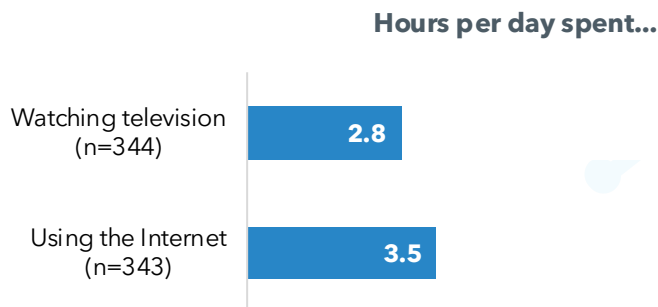

MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE MISUSE

Mental health and substance misuse are integral to overall health because they profoundly impact an individual's ability to cope with daily stressors, maintain relationships, make sound decisions, and engage in self-care, all of which are foundational to physical well-being. Untreated mental health conditions and substance misuse can exacerbate or lead to chronic physical illnesses like cardiovascular disease and diabetes, underscoring the interconnectedness of mind and body in achieving holistic health.

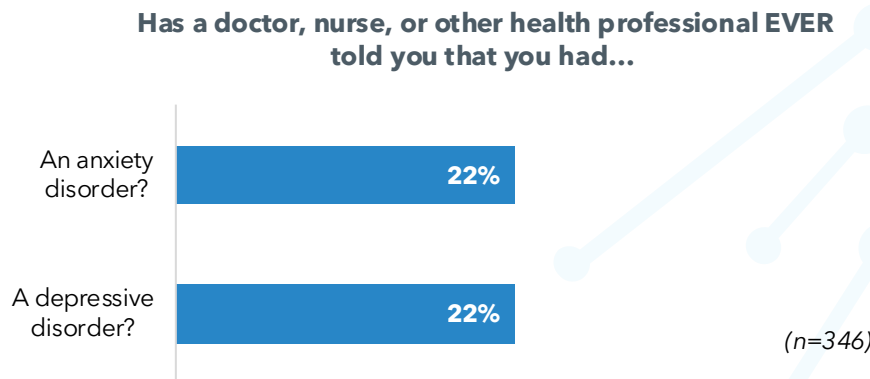

Mental and Social Health

According to the representative survey, 22% of respondents reported ever being diagnosed with an anxiety disorder and 22% were diagnosed with a depressive disorder.

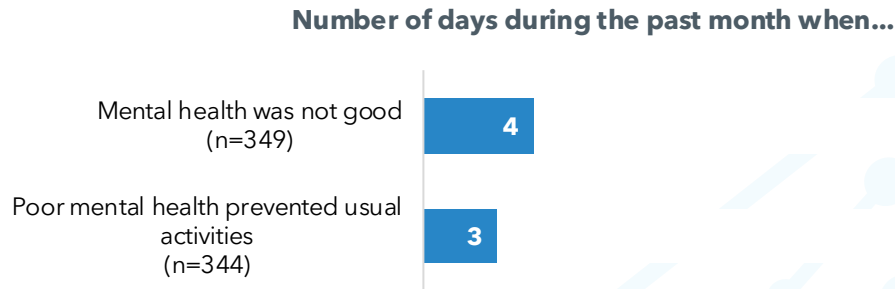
Respondents aged 18-59 are more likely to have been diagnosed with anxiety (27.7%) than respondents aged 60 or over (9.3%).

Respondents with household incomes less than \$100,000 are more likely to have been diagnosed with anxiety (28.9%) than those with household incomes \$100,000 or higher (5.3%).

Respondents aged 18-59 are more likely to have been diagnosed with depression (29.4%) than respondents aged 60 or over (5.8%).

Respondents with household incomes less than \$100,000 are more likely to have been diagnosed with depression (28.6%) than those with household incomes \$100,000 or higher (6.0%).

According to the representative survey, residents did not have good mental health on 4 of the past 30 days, on average. Additionally, poor mental health prevented residents from doing their normal activities on an average of 3 of the past 30 days.



Mental health was not good on four or more days (past month) in 2023: 29% & in 2026: 29%.



Respondents aged 18-39 were more likely to report at least one day when their mental health was not good (74.8%) than those aged 40 and over (33.4%).

Of those who reported at least one poor mental health day, those with an associate degree reported poor mental health on more days, on average, (14.4) than those with a graduate or professional degree (5.4).

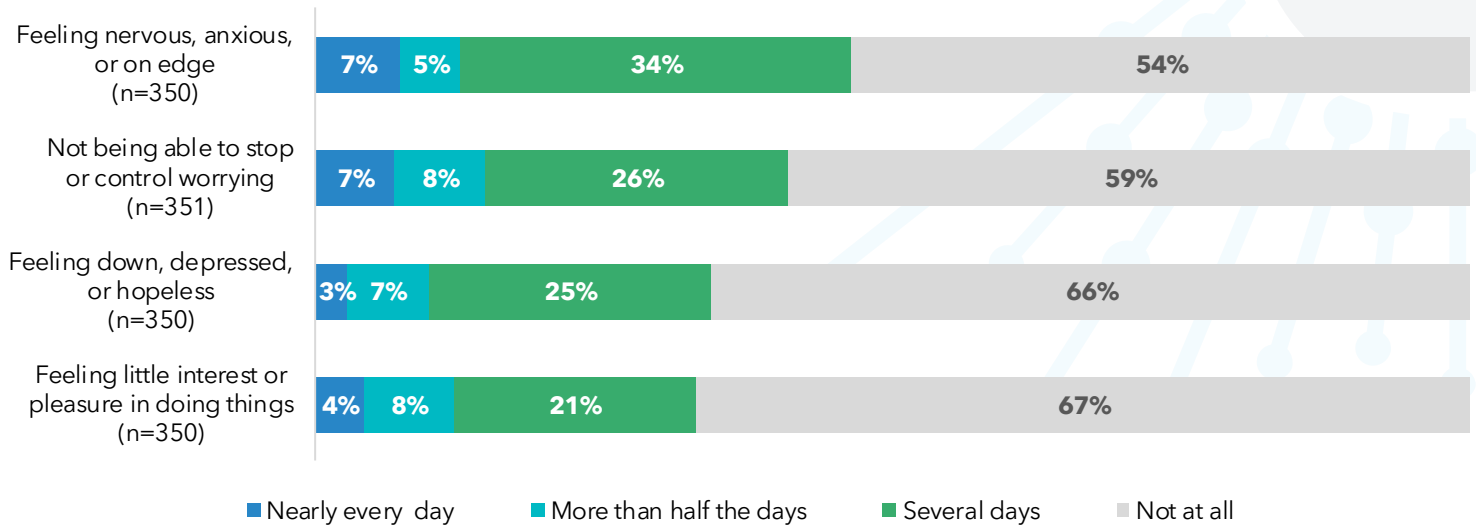
Female respondents were more likely to report at least one day when poor mental health kept them from their usual activities (32.4%) than non-female respondents (17.8%).

Respondents with household incomes less than \$100,000 had more days when poor mental health kept them from their usual activities, on average, (13.6) than those with household incomes of \$100,000 or higher (5.5).

Respondents with an associate degree had more days when poor mental health kept them from their usual activities, on average, (22.3) than those with a graduate or professional degree (3.2).

A little less than half of residents (46%) felt anxious at least several days during the two weeks prior to completing the survey.

During the past 2 weeks, how often have you been bothered by the following problems?

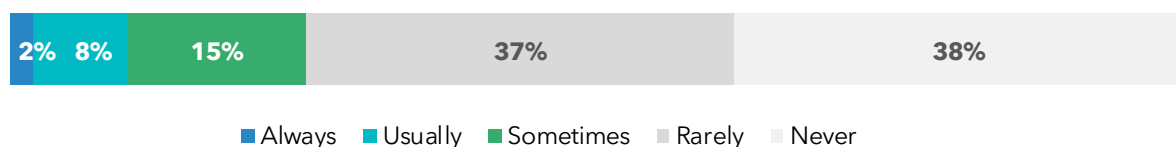


Respondents with household incomes below \$50,000 were more likely to report being bothered by little interest or pleasure in doing things (47.8%) than those with household incomes \$50,000 or higher (28.0%).

Respondents with household incomes below \$50,000 were more likely to report being bothered by feeling down, depressed, or hopeless several days or more (49.4%) than those with incomes \$50,000 or higher (30.0%).

One quarter of residents (25%) reported that they feel lonely or isolated at least sometimes.

According to the representative survey, **4%** of respondents seriously **considered attempting suicide** in the past year.

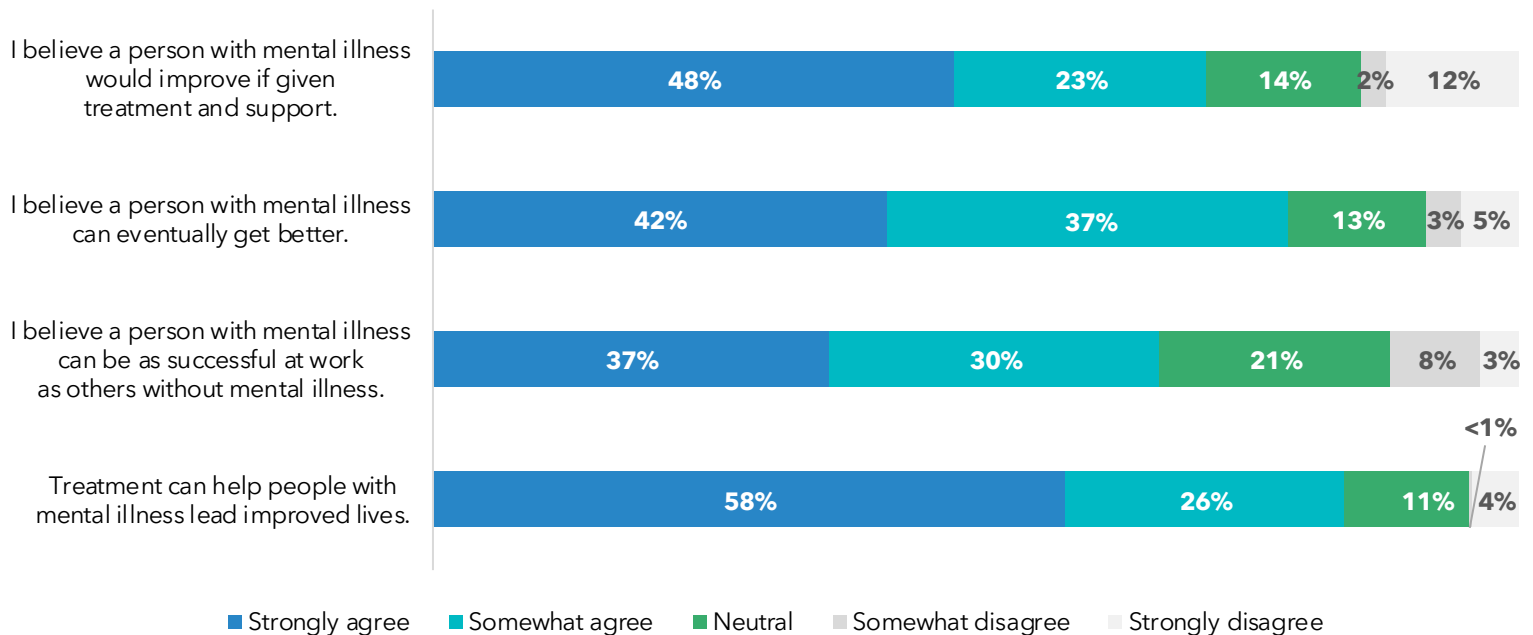

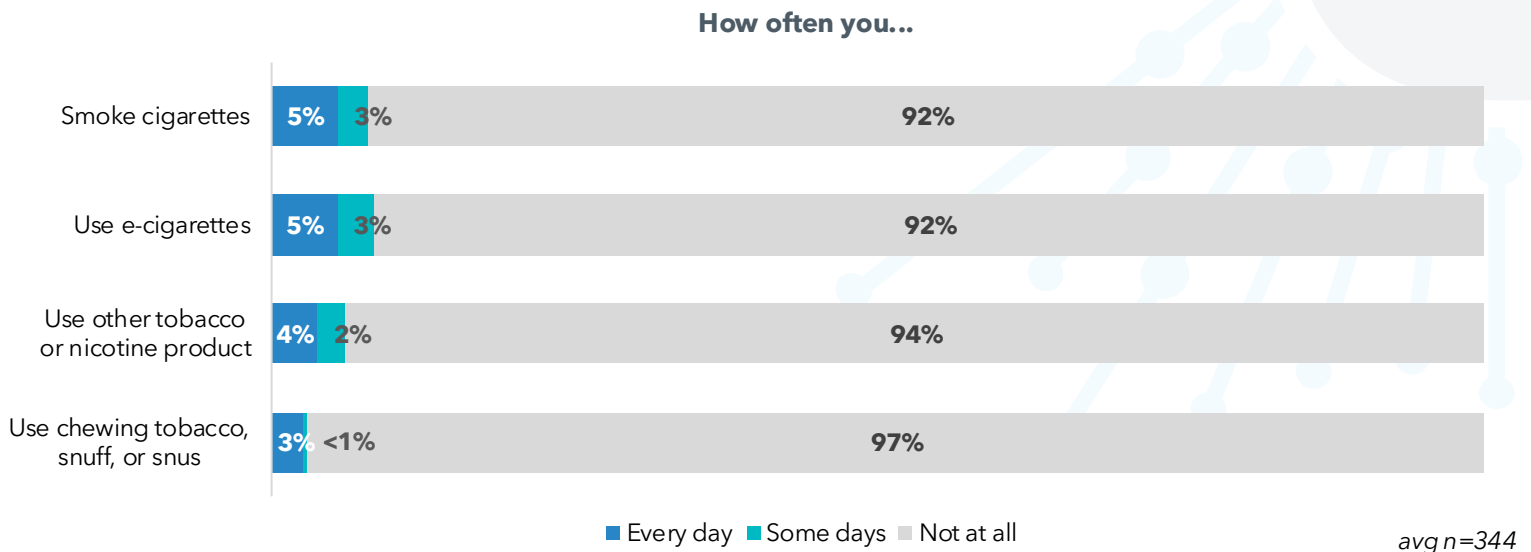
Perceptions of Mental Illness

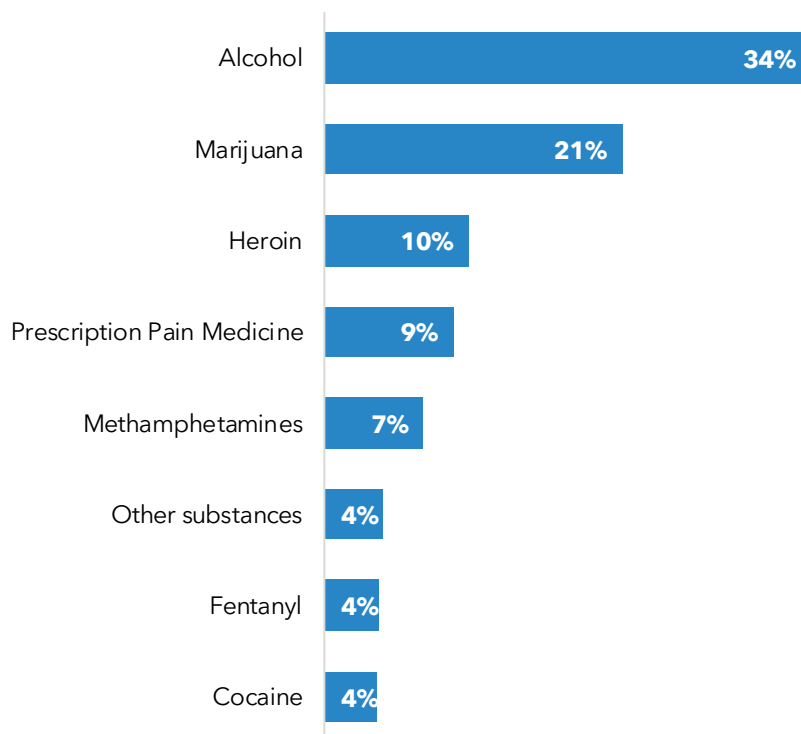

Respondents with more than a high school degree/GED were more likely to report personally knowing someone in Huron county with an alcohol abuse or addiction problem (45.9%) than those with a high school degree/GED or less (27.2%).

According to the survey, **misuse of prescription medication** was very uncommon. Residents reported having done this on average **less than 1 day** in the past month.

Marijuana was legalized for adult (21+) recreational use in Ohio in 2023. According to the survey, 15.6% of residents used marijuana at least once within the past 30 days. Residents reported having used this on average **2 days** in the past month. Half (50%) of residents who used marijuana or cannabis in the past month did so for both medical and non-medical reasons.

Among marijuana/cannabis users, those with more than a high school degree/GED had more cannabis use days, on average, (18.7) than those with a high school degree/GED or less (8.9).

The most common cause of unintentional drug overdose deaths in Huron County and Ohio are opioids. In 2024, 100 Naloxone administrations were recorded by EMS in Huron County. For Ohio in the same time period 22,124 administrations were recorded.

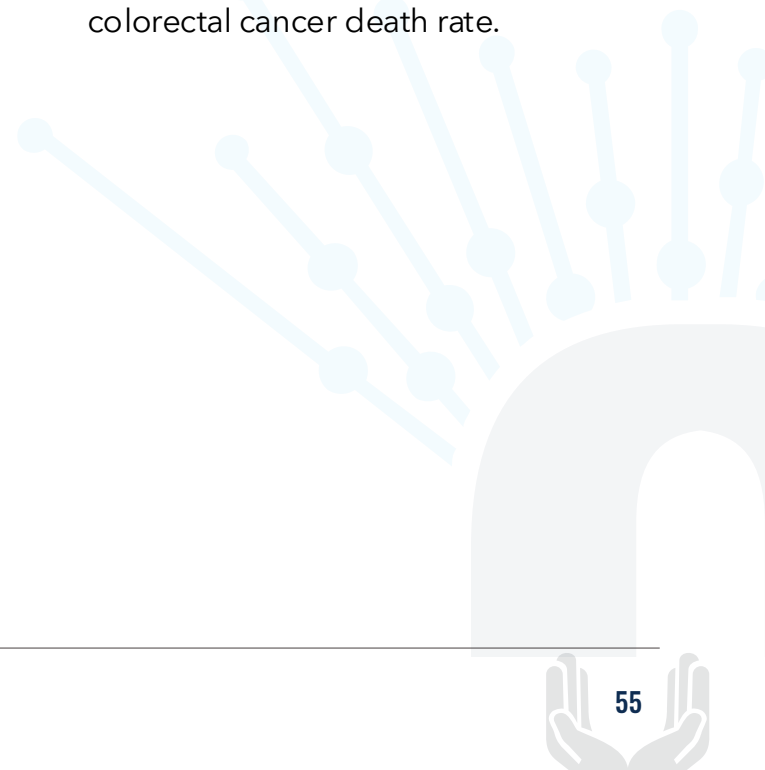

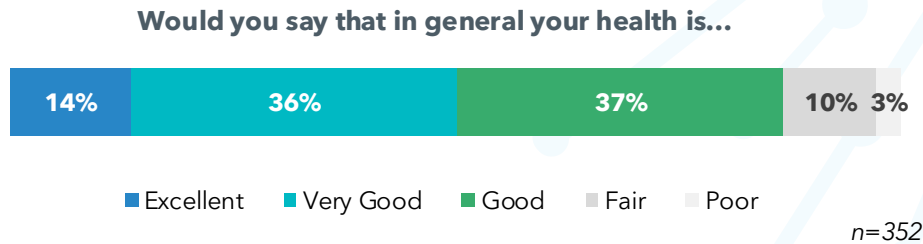

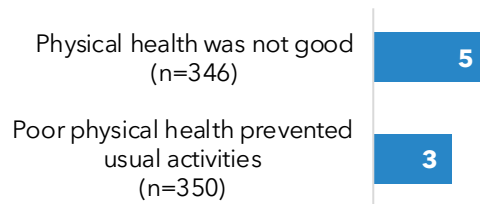

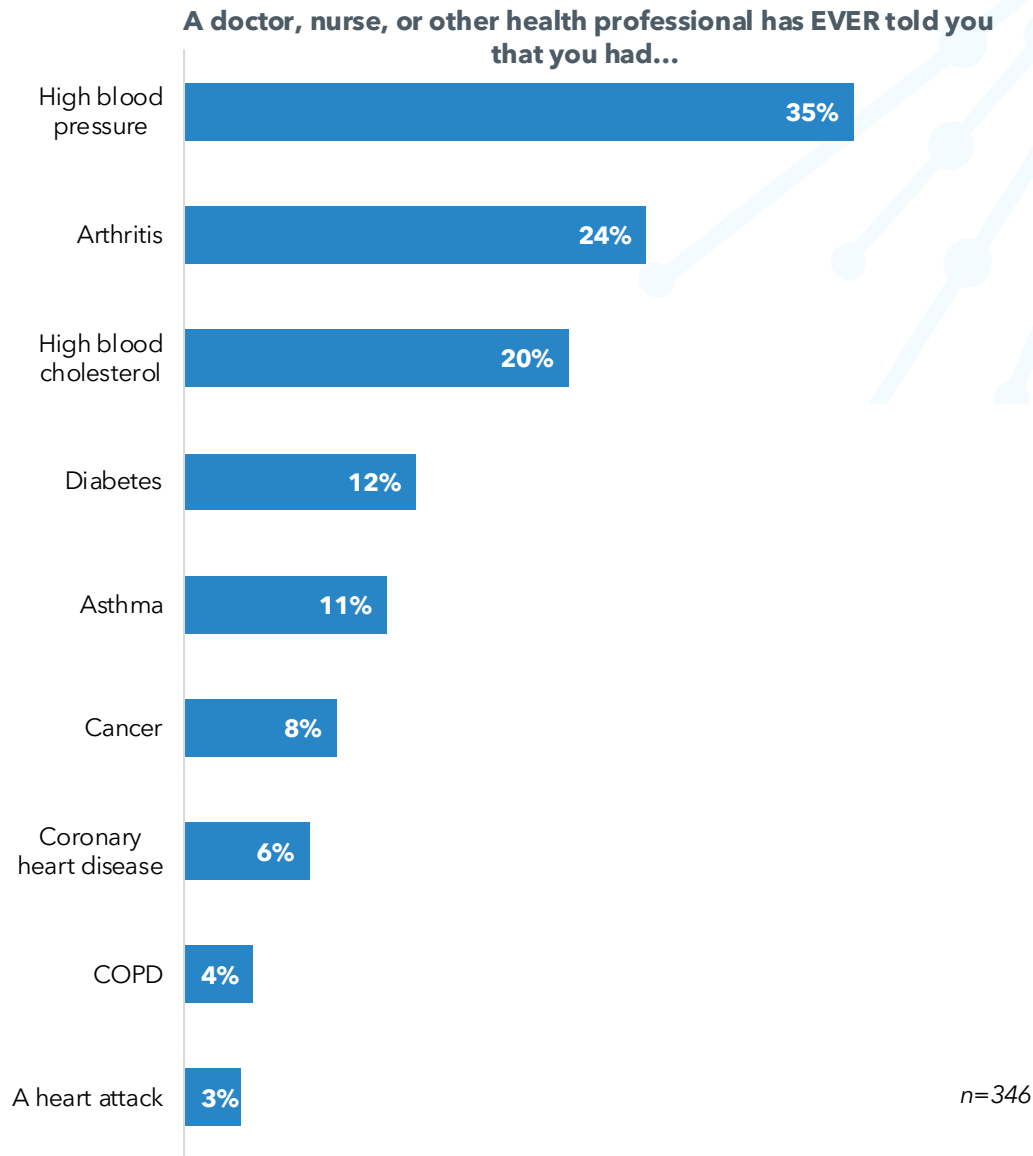

Respondents without children in the household were more likely to report having high blood pressure (40.2%) than those with at least one child in the household (22.9%).

Respondents aged 40 or over were more likely to report having high blood cholesterol (28.6%) than those aged 18-39 (1.6%).

Respondents with at least one child in the household were more likely to report not having any of these health conditions (50.1%) than those without children in the household (24.4%).

Respondents aged 18-59 were more likely to report not having any of these health conditions (40.7%) than those aged 60 and over (15.2%).

Respondents with less than a bachelor's degree were more likely to report not having any of these health conditions (36.6%) than those with a bachelor's degree or higher (9.7%).

Huron County's 2026 Community Health Assessment

Kickoff Debrief

On February 11, 2026, a group of Huron County community members representing a diverse array of public health, health system, social service, and other governmental entities participated in a robust discussion about the upcoming community health assessment (CHA) effort.

After receiving a brief orientation to the plan for this CHA effort, the community members split up into three small groups. The groups discussed three questions across three rounds, and some members switched groups between each round such that the groups were different for each round:

Discussion Questions:

Round 1: What does a healthy Huron County look like to you?

Round 2: Given your vision for a healthy Huron County, what do you think are the biggest barriers or issues that are keeping the county from getting there?

Round 3: Overall, what do you believe are the **three most important** issues that should be considered in our upcoming community health assessment and planning work?

After finishing the small group conversations, the community members shared their group's perceptions of the most important issues to be considered in the CHA process to the large group. Overall, many groups discussed similar issues, resulting in a consensus that the following issues should be incorporated into this effort (at a broad level). Generally, social determinants of health and mental health were considered key issues to consider - those topics will be priorities in terms of the research conducted.

Important issues:

Transportation

- County-wide
- On demand
- Easy to schedule
- Convenient hours of operation and pick up windows
- Expanding on what's already available

- Reducing stigma
- Recognizing when you need help

Community Health Snapshot

The 2026 Community Profiles for Huron County provide a comprehensive overview of the demographic, economic, housing, and social characteristics of communities throughout the county. Overall, the profiles demonstrate that while many areas of Huron County experience strong homeownership rates, stable populations, and moderate household incomes, there are also significant differences between municipalities and townships that may influence health outcomes and quality of life.

Countywide, Huron County has a population of 58,565 residents, with 23.0% under the age of 18 and 18.8% age 65 years and older. The county median household income is \$65,972, which is lower than the Ohio median household income of \$72,212. Approximately 12.0% of county residents live below the poverty level, and 16.2% report living with a disability.

Several key trends emerged throughout the profiles:

- **Income levels** vary substantially across communities. Communities such as Peru Township and Lyme Township report some of the highest median household incomes in the county at \$122,903 and \$112,591, respectively, while Willard and New London Township report lower median household incomes of \$54,572 and \$53,557.
- **Poverty rates** also differ significantly throughout the county. Some communities report poverty rates below 5%, including Ripley Township at 0.6% and Bronson Township at 1.0%, while New Haven Township reports a poverty rate of 19.8%.
- **Disability prevalence** varies across Huron County communities. New Haven Township reports the highest disability rate at 27.9%, while Ripley Township and Clarksfield Township report some of the lowest disability rates at 6.6% and 6.9%.
- **Housing stability** appears to be a strength in many areas of the county. The countywide homeownership rate is 73.6%, exceeding the Ohio average of 68.0%. Some townships, including Lyme Township, report homeownership rates above 90%.
- **Population age distribution** differs throughout the county. Townsend Township has one of the oldest populations, with 32.4% of residents aged 65 years and older, while Ripley Township has one of the youngest populations, with 44.9% of residents under the age of 18.
- **Diversity** varies throughout the county. Willard reports the largest Hispanic population at 21.35%, followed by New Haven Township at 10.46%.

Overall, the profiles highlight the importance of examining data at the local level. The information demonstrates that community conditions vary significantly across Huron County and reinforces the need for targeted, community-specific approaches when addressing public health priorities, economic development, housing needs, aging populations, and access to services.

Homeownership Rate: The percentage of occupied housing units that are owner-occupied.

Total Housing Units: The total number of residential housing units, including occupied and vacant homes.

Social Determinants of Health: The social, economic, and environmental conditions that influence health outcomes and quality of life.

APPENDIX E: Health Disparities in Huron County

This appendix provides a complete list of subgroup differences identified from the Huron County Health Survey

Differences by gender:

- Female respondents were more likely to report cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted their relationships with other people (20.1%) than non-female respondents (7.4%).
- Female respondents were more likely to report personally knowing someone in Huron County who was homeless in the past year (17.6%) than non-female respondents (6.0%).
- Female respondents were more likely to have traveled outside of Huron County to receive health care in the past 12 months (57.7%) than non-female respondents (39.0%).
- Non-female respondents did strengthening or toning exercises on more days, on average, (2.0) than female respondents (1.1).
- Female respondents were more likely to report at least one day when poor mental health kept them from their usual activities (32.4%) than non-female respondents (17.8%).
- Non-female respondents were more likely to report at least one day when their physical health was not good (53.9%) than were female respondents (33.6%).
- Among respondents who reported drinking 100% fruit juice in the past 7 days, female respondents drank juice more times, on average, (3.4) than non-female respondents (2.5).

Differences by geographic location:

- Norwalk respondents were more likely to report personally knowing someone in Huron County who was homeless in the past year (21.1%) than those outside Norwalk (6.5%).
- Norwalk respondents were more likely to report wanting more playgrounds for physical activity or leisure (25.3%) than those outside Norwalk (9.8%).
- Among active respondents, those outside Norwalk had more physically active days, on average, (4.9) than Norwalk respondents (3.9).
- Norwalk respondents were more likely to report having visited a doctor for a routine checkup in the past year (84.9%) than those outside Norwalk (67.6%).
- Respondents outside Norwalk were more likely to report having transportation issues at least a few times a year (73.8%) than those in Norwalk (41.4%).

Differences by education:

- Among respondents who reported eating fruit in the past 7 days, those with a graduate or professional degree ate fruit the most, on average, (9.6 times) and those with an associate degree ate fruit the least (4.8 times).
- Respondents with less than a bachelor's degree were more likely to report drinking regular soda or pop in the past 7 days (55.3%) than those with a bachelor's degree or higher (27.7%).
- Reporting that cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted anxiety and/or depression was highest among respondents with a bachelor's degree (47.7%) and lowest among respondents with less than a 12th grade education (12.5%).
- Respondents with more than a high school degree/GED were more likely to report that cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted their exercise habits (17.3%) than those with a high school degree/GED or less (2.7%).
- Reporting that cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted relationships with other people was highest among respondents with a bachelor's degree (23.0%) and lowest among respondents with less than a 12th grade education (2.6%).
- Reporting that cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted financial stability was highest among respondents with a bachelor's degree (48.5%) and lowest among respondents with less than a 12th grade education (2.6%).
- Respondents with more than a high school degree/GED were more likely to report cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted their nutrition habits (30.2%) than those with a high school degree/GED or less (12.6%).
- Respondents with a bachelor's degree or higher were more likely to report no transportation issues (94.1%) than those with less than a bachelor's degree (71.7%).
- Those with more than a high school degree/GED were more likely to have traveled outside of Huron County to receive health care in the past 12 months (60.2%) than those with less than a high school degree/GED (37.6%).
- Respondents with more than a high school degree/GED were more likely to report wanting more walking paths for physical activity or leisure (64.5%) than those with a high school degree/GED or less (47.4%).
- Respondents with more than a high school degree/GED were more likely to report wanting more bike paths for physical activity or leisure (41.2%) than those with a high school degree/GED or less (21.3%).
- Reporting wanting more parks for physical activity or leisure was highest among respondents with a bachelor's degree (44.2%) and lowest among those with less than a 12th grade education (4.2%).
- Respondents with a high school degree/GED or less were more likely to report not wanting more outdoor spaces for physical activity or leisure (35.0%) than those with more than a high school degree/GED (20.0%).
- Respondents with a bachelor's degree or higher were more likely to report strengthening or toning exercises on at least one day during the past 7 days (56.5%) than those with less than a bachelor's degree (34.4%).
- Respondents with less than a bachelor's degree were more likely to report being overweight or obese (82.3%) than those with a bachelor's degree or higher (59.3%).
- Of those who reported at least one poor mental health day, those with an associate degree reported poor mental health on more days, on average, (14.4) than those with a graduate or professional degree (5.4).
- Respondents with an associate degree had more days when poor mental health kept them from their usual activities, on average, (22.3) than those with a graduate or professional degree (3.2).
- Those with less than a bachelor's degree were more likely to report having smoked at least 100 cigarettes in their lifetime (44.2%) than those with a bachelor's degree or higher (13.7%).
- Reported binge-drinking in the past 30 days was highest among respondents with an associate degree (51.0%) and lowest among respondents with less than a 12th grade education (1.1%).
- Respondents with more than a high school degree/GED were more likely to report personally knowing someone in Huron county with an alcohol abuse or addiction problem (45.9%) than those with a high school degree/GED or less (27.2%).

- Among marijuana/cannabis users, those with more than a high school degree/GED had more cannabis use days, on average, (18.7) than those with a high school degree/GED or less (8.9).
- Respondents with more than a high school degree/GED education were more likely to report at least one day when physical health was not good (55.6%) than those with a high school degree/GED or less education (33.8%).
- Those with a bachelor's degree or higher were more likely to report having arthritis (41.4%) than those with less than a bachelor's degree (20.9%).
- Reported hours per day spent on the Internet was highest among respondents with graduate or professional degree (4.2) and lowest among respondents with less than a 12th grade education (1.5).
- Respondents with less than a bachelor's degree were more likely to report not having any of these health conditions (36.6%) than those with a bachelor's degree or higher (9.7%).
- Respondents with a high school degree/GED or less were more likely to report having transportation issues at least a few times a year (88.2%) than those with more than a high school degree/GED (37.6%).

Differences by presence of children in the household:

- Respondents with at least one child in the household were more likely to report that cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted their exercise habits (18.7%) than respondents without children in the household (5.6%).
- Respondents without children in the household were more likely to report wanting more walking paths for physical activity or leisure (63.4%) than those with at least one child in the household (39.0%).
- Respondents with at least one child in the household were more likely to report wanting more playgrounds for physical activity or leisure (31.6%) than those without children in the household (7.7%).
- Respondents with at least one child in the household were more likely to report strengthening or toning exercises on at least one day during the past 7 days (51.6%) than those without children in the household (31.7%).
- Respondents with at least one child in the household were more likely to report having smoked at least 100 cigarettes in their lifetime (54.8%) than those without children in the household (32.4%).
- Respondents without children in the household were more likely to report having high blood pressure (40.2%) than those with at least one child in the household (22.9%).
- Respondents with at least one child in the household were more likely to report not having any of these health conditions (50.1%) than those without children in the household (24.4%).

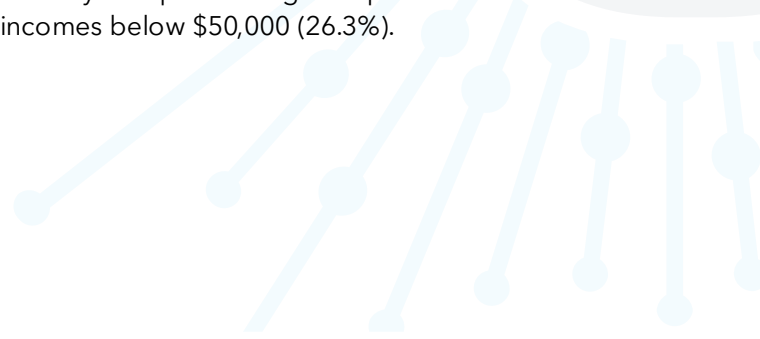

- Those with household incomes of \$50,000 or higher ate vegetables more times in the past 7 days, on average, (6.6) than those with household incomes below \$50,000 (4.7).
- Respondents with household incomes of \$25,000-\$49,999 drank regular soda the most in the past 7 days, on average, (3.4 times) and those with household incomes of \$50,000-\$74,999 drank regular soda the least (1.1 times).
- Respondents with household incomes below \$50,000 were more likely to report that cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted their exercise habits (17.6%) than those with household incomes of \$50,000 or higher (5.0%).
- Respondents with household incomes below \$50,000 were more likely to report that cost of living / economy changes negatively impacted their nutrition habits (34.4%) than those with household incomes of \$50,000 or higher (13.3%).
- Reporting no transportation issues was highest among respondents with household incomes of \$25,000-\$49,999 (88.9%) and lowest among respondents with household incomes below \$25,000 (31.5%).
- Those with household incomes \$100,000 or higher are more likely to not delay physical health care (85.1%) than those with household incomes below \$100,000 (58.5%).
- Those with household incomes \$50,000 or higher are more likely to not delay mental health care (83.1%) than those with household incomes below \$50,000 (61.3%).
- Reporting wanting more walking paths for physical activity or leisure was highest among respondents with household incomes below \$25,000 (79.9%) and lowest among respondents with household incomes of \$75,000-\$99,999 (40.5%).
- Respondents with household incomes of \$50,000 or more were more likely to report not wanting more outdoor spaces for physical activity or leisure (33.8%) than those with household incomes below \$50,000 (16.3%).
- Reporting strengthening or toning exercises on at least one day during the past 7 days was highest among respondents with household incomes of \$50,000-\$74,999 (56.1%) and lowest among respondents with household incomes below \$25,000 (22.7%).
- Reported hours per day spent on the Internet was highest among respondents with household incomes below \$25,000 (5.2) and lowest among respondents with household incomes of \$25,000-\$49,000 (2.6).
- Respondents with household incomes less than \$100,000 are more likely to have been diagnosed with anxiety (28.9%) than those with household incomes \$100,000 or higher (5.3%).
- Respondents with household incomes less than \$100,000 are more likely to have been diagnosed with depression (28.6%) than those with household incomes \$100,000 or higher (6.0%).
- Respondents with household incomes less than \$100,000 had more days when poor mental health kept them from their usual activities, on average, (13.6) than those with household incomes of \$100,000 or higher (5.5).
- Respondents with household incomes below \$50,000 were more likely to report being bothered by little interest or pleasure in doing things (47.8%) than those with household incomes \$50,000 or higher (28.0%).
- Respondents with household incomes below \$50,000 were more likely to report being bothered by feeling down, depressed, or hopeless several days or more (49.4%) than those with incomes \$50,000 or higher (30.0%).
- Respondents with household incomes below \$50,000 were more likely to report feeling lonely or isolated at least sometimes (39.7%) than those with incomes \$50,000 or more (19.2%).
- Among marijuana/cannabis users, those with household incomes below \$25,000 had the most cannabis use days, on average, (26.1) and those with household incomes of \$50,000-\$74,999 had the fewest (4.2).
- Respondents with household incomes below \$50,000 were more likely to report at least one day when their physical health was not good (58.8%) than those with household incomes of \$50,000 or higher (35.9%).
- Respondents with household incomes below \$50,000 were more likely to report at least one day when physical health kept them from usual activities (41.6%) than those with household incomes of \$50,000 or higher (19.2%).

- Respondents with household incomes of \$50,000 or more were more likely to report having visited a doctor for a routine checkup in the past year (81.0%) than those with household incomes below \$50,000 (60.8%).
- Respondents with household incomes of \$50,000 or more were more likely to report having visited a dentist/dental clinic in the past year (70.1%) than those with household incomes below \$50,000 (45.4%).
- Respondents with household incomes \$100,000 or higher are more likely to report that getting fresh fruits and vegetables is not difficult at all (93.9%) than those with household incomes below \$100,000 (69.3%).
- Those with household incomes \$50,000 or higher were more likely to report having transportation issues at least a few times a year (82.7%) than those with household incomes below \$50,000 (26.3%).

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Background

Nationally, trends in youth behaviors and risk and protective factors are measured using school-based surveys such as the Monitoring the Future Survey (MTF) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) and Youth Tobacco Survey (YTS). These surveys provide valuable national and state-level data; however, they do not provide county or school district-level data. Communities have needed access to local data to address community-specific needs and to conduct health assessments. Over the years, they have deployed a wide variety of local surveys in an attempt to address these needs, often investing substantial resources to have private survey companies collect the local data. Having many different survey instruments means the results are then not always comparable across surveys nor over time, and counties and districts cannot usually benchmark results to state or regional samples. Consequently, communities across Ohio have repeatedly called for an inexpensive and valid survey of youth to guide local policy, program development, and implementation efforts.

About the OHYES!

Purpose

The Ohio Healthy Youth Environments Survey (OHYES!) is a collaborative effort of the Ohio Departments of Education and Workforce, Health, Behavioral Health, Ohio National Guard, and representatives from higher education, juvenile courts, foundations, and community service providers.

There are two main purposes of the OHYES! First, the OHYES! addresses the need for data on local trends in youth behaviors and risk and protective factors. Second, it helps community-based organizations meet federal grant reporting requirements, including ones from: Strategic Prevention Framework Partnerships for Success, Drug Free Communities, Safe Schools and Healthy Students, Communities that Care Grants, and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Prevention and Treatment Block Grant National Outcome Measures (NOMs). Additionally, the OHYES! data may help communities when applying for local grants through foundations such as the United Way. It may also help communities meet the requirements for local health department needs assessments.

Instrument

The OHYES! survey questions cover the following topics: Demographics, Alcohol, Tobacco and Vapor Products, Marijuana, Prescription Misuse and Illicit Drugs, Bullying, Safety and School Climate, Physical Health and Well-being, Mental Health and Suicide, Gambling, Parental Attitudes toward Substance Use, Community, Family and Peer Factors such as Adverse Childhood Experiences, School Success, and Prevention Messaging. As part of a periodic review process, the instrument was revised in the 2025-2026 school year. Schools may administer the standard OHYES! survey instrument, which includes 110 questions. In addition, school districts may choose to use an optional version that includes ten sexual health and victimization questions that could be sensitive to some communities. This report includes all 120 items that appear on the optional version of the survey. Please see table notes for items that only appear on the optional version of the survey and are not asked when schools administer the standard version of the instrument. Currently, the survey instrument is available in English and Spanish. More information about the survey and copies of the survey instrument can be found on the OHYES! website at <https://youthsurveys.ohio.gov>.

Survey Administration

The OHYES! is a voluntary, web-based survey that is available to schools free of charge. Previously the survey was conducted every four years, but could be administered more frequently if a community identifies a need. Beginning in Fall 2020, the survey is conducted every two years, and can still be administered annually based on community need. OHYES! transitioned to a fall only administration beginning with the 2022-2023 school year. During the 2025-2026 school year, the survey was administered from October 3 to December 19, 2025. All students in Ohio schools in grades 7 through 12 (age 12 or older) are eligible to participate. Superintendents and principals are recruited to have their schools complete the survey; they select the grades and percentage of students in those grades to participate and school staff administer the survey.

Confidentiality

OHYES! protects student confidentiality and anonymity in multiple ways. The survey does not request or include individual student identification numbers. School survey administrators are provided protocols to maintain the privacy and confidentiality of the participants during administration. Data is collected using Qualtrics, a web-based survey platform; no information is stored on school servers. Qualtrics removes respondent IP address and location data, and stores the data on secured, encrypted, and password-protected servers. Results are downloaded to the Ohio Department of Behavioral Health (DBH) and are stored on secure, password-protected servers.

Consent

Prior to the survey administration, parents are notified and provided information about the survey. Then, they have three weeks to submit an Opt-Out Form to exclude their child from participating. Before beginning the survey, students complete an assent process to acknowledge that: the survey is voluntary and they can skip questions or stop at any time; their answers are anonymous and do not include names or identification numbers; the OHYES! is a survey, not a test, and there are no right or wrong answers; and they commit to thoughtfully answering the questions. Students are required to agree to participate before answering any survey items.

Survey Accessibility

To increase participation in OHYES! and improve validity, the 2025-2026 survey underwent a rigorous English-to-Spanish translation process. DBH partnered with Propio to translate the survey into Spanish. Feedback from native and fluent Spanish-speaking partners was collected from the Spanish-Speaking Prevention Advisory Committee, DBH staff, and PIRE. This ensured the survey was both understandable and did not lose the original meaning of the survey questions. Using Qualtrics' built-in language support features, participants could toggle between English and Spanish versions of the survey based on their language preferences at any point of the survey. Additionally, Qualtrics used the default browser language to determine if the survey should be first displayed in English or Spanish.

The 2025-2026 administration of OHYES! served as a pilot for the Spanish option and offered insights for future data collection, including ensuring the online survey worked as expected, required updates to administration protocols, and additional questions needed to better understand the demographics of OHYES! participants.

About this Report

Participants

This report includes results for Huron County and all Ohio students who participated in the OHYES! survey during the 2025-2026 school year. The following school districts in Huron County participated in the OHYES! survey during the 2025-2026 school year: Bellevue City, Monroeville Local, New London Local, Norwalk City, South Central Local, Western Reserve Local, Willard City.

It should be noted that in these reports, public schools are classified under the county to which their school district is assigned by the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce, as opposed to the county in which the school is located. Schools that are not public schools are classified under the county in which the school is located. This differs from OHYES! survey reports in school years prior to 2020-2021, where public schools were classified by their location.

Limitations

As a reminder, the OHYES! was designed to provide actionable local data for district superintendents and school principals based on a voluntary sample of surveyed youth. The OHYES! data were collected based on a descriptive, cross-sectional survey design with a non-probability sampling method. The voluntary nature of the survey means that the OHYES! results are not generalizable to all Ohio youth. Further, county-level OHYES! results may not represent all students in a given county or school district. As with any studies using survey methodology, any interpretations from the OHYES! data must keep these limitations in mind. This report may not provide numbers that are an exact match to the data available in the online OHYES! Dashboards. This is due to data suppression rules and differing data subset criteria.
